

Introduction: Rethinking the Path to Jesus

So, how do we visualize this journey in a way that honors its unpredictable, relational nature?


Enter the Kingdom Spiral


Imagine a spiral.

At the very center of that spiral is Jesus and you.

Winding around that center are the people in your life. Some are further out. Some are moving closer. All are in motion.

This is the Kingdom Spiral—a relational map that helps you see people not as "projects to be converted," but as souls to be loved and companions on a journey toward the center: Jesus Himself.





How People Enter the Spiral

People don't step into the spiral because you have perfect theology.

They enter because they feel seen, heard, and valued.

That's the first move: **Expressing VALUE**.

When someone feels deeply valued by you, they instinctively draw near—not just to you, but to Jesus in you.

How People Move Through the Spiral

Once inside the spiral, a person continues drawing near when they experience safety and mutual trust. This is cultivated when you courageously reveal your own vulnerability—your imperfections, doubts, fears, and hopes.

Forming TRUST through being sincere and open. Vulnerability opens hearts.


And into that space, you are **Planting HOPE**—not through scripted evangelism, but through natural, everyday conversations. You speak from your life, not at their lives. This is where Jesus shows up—not as a doctrine, but as a person. Up close. Personal. Real.

The Power of Proximity

The Kingdom Spiral invites you to consider: Where are the people in my life in proximity to Jesus? Where are they in their openness to Him—and to me?



This isn't about labeling or ranking people. It's about seeing them with new eyes—spiritual eyes. It's about becoming aware of the relational space you hold and steward with each person.

You're not called to pull people to Jesus.

You're called to walk with them, spiraling inward, step by step.

Why This Matters

- People are not problems to be fixed.
- Evangelism is not a performance.
